I have had the honour of serving on the Shepherds of Good Hope Board of Directors for 11 years.

During my tenure, I have witnessed an evolution in the sophistication of how we deliver care to many of the most vulnerable men and women in Ottawa. We've achieved this by creating groundbreaking, innovative programs and services to connect people to the supports they need to face — and overcome — their challenges.

At the Board level, we've also experienced an evolution, including a diversification in the skills and experiences around the table. Our role is to ensure Shepherds of Good Hope is well positioned to continue delivering innovative programs and specialized care to our clients and residents. In turn, we are accountable to the members of Shepherds of Good Hope.

This past year, we embarked on strengthening the work of our Board committees, of which there are three: Governance, Human Resources and Finance. All committees make recommendations to the Board in their specific areas to ensure that, as Directors, we have the information required to make informed, evidence-based decisions and provide strategic direction to the organization.

We are currently in year two of a three-year strategic plan titled *Beyond a Soup Kitchen*. We are committed to continuing to provide innovative programs and services in our shelter that also align with the City of Ottawa's 10-Year Housing and Homelessness Plan. This approach connects homeless individuals to the right supports so that we can reduce long-term shelter stays and assist them in finding safe, affordable and stable housing.

We remain financially and operationally strong through

generous donations from our community and via partnerships with the City of Ottawa, Ottawa Inner City Health Inc., Carefor, The Royal Ottawa Mental Health Centre, the Canadian Mental Health Association, the Champlain Local Health Integration Network (LHIN) and various granting agencies.

This year's Annual General Meeting marks my last day serving as a Shepherds of Good Hope Board member; however, I am still committed to the work Shepherds of Good Hope does and will connect to the organization in various ways during the years to come.

It has been a deeply touching and spiritual 11-year journey, and one that has provided me with more than I could have ever imagined. The deep connection I have felt with the staff, volunteers and clients of Shepherds will be with me for a lifetime. I have watched as this organization has ventured beyond its original mandate to feed, clothe and shelter. I'm proud of our values — to turn no one away and to serve without judgement those who come to us.

I am honoured to have been part of this incredible organization. I feel blessed to have worked with so many people committed to improving the lives of so many. Thank you for being a part of the Shepherds community and for taking this journey with me.

We appreciate the many opportunities we have to make a difference in the lives of our clients and residents, as well as those in need in our community.

We are half-way into the second year of our three-year strategic plan, Beyond a Soup Kitchen. The plan focuses on providing Innovative Programs and Services, being a Caring Employer and supporting our clients, partnering agencies, volunteers and donors through extensive Community Outreach.

Our strategic directions are focused on Transitional Shelter Services, Supportive Living, Investing in our Employees, Governance and Administration, Marketing and Communications, Fundraising and Social Enterprise.

We play an instrumental role in meeting people at whatever stage they are in their journey, without judgement. We assist them in obtaining housing and connecting them to needed supports so that they can succeed in the ways they themselves define.

This past year, we made major strides in achieving our goals, including:

- Transferring many clients who had stayed in the shelter for years to housing with supports.
- Enhancing our partnership with Ottawa Paramedic Services so that high needs clients requiring medical care were brought to our Transitional Emergency Shelter Program (TESP), instead of hospital emergency rooms.
- Increasing our Client Services Team so that the men and women who come to us for help are quickly connected to the supports they require to address

challenges before becoming episodically or chronically homeless.

- Providing a welcoming atmosphere in our Soup Kitchen for our clients and community members to access meals and to feel less isolated.
- Expanding our Managed Alcohol Program to help chronic alcoholics achieve better health outcomes.

We are bolstered by 400+ volunteers who support us financially and by giving generously of their time. We are blessed with committed donors in the community and from local businesses.

We have approximately 195 dedicated employees who provide frontline services, case management expertise, coordination of activities, and management of programs and services. They are supported by a dynamic seasoned leadership team.

We are honoured to be a part of this incredible organization. We commit to assisting those who need us most. Thank you for helping us achieve our mission of *creating community for all through acceptance, compassion and care.*



Innovative Programs







Every homeless man and woman needs the basics — food, shelter and clothing. But those are just the first steps. Many are suffering from mental health challenges, addictions and trauma. At Shepherds of Good Hope, every man and woman has equal access to innovative programs and services dedicated to improving their overall health and emotional well being.

TESP

Transitional Emergency Shelter Program

Capacity for **49 men and women**. A place for men and women who need medical attention to address specific issues. Staffed with nurses, client care workers, frontline staff, case managers and nurses.

MAP

Managed Alcohol Program

Harm reduction for chronic alcoholics. **24 men and women** at the shelter, **30 men and women** at The Oaks. Staffed with nurses, client care workers, frontline staff, case managers and nurses.

WSCU

Women's Special Care Unit

For women dealing with complex mental and physical health issues. Capacity for **16 women**. Staffed with nurses, client care workers, frontline staff, case managers and nurses.

DIVERSION

In a partnership with emergency services, homeless patients can be diverted to Shepherds of Good Hope rather than the Ottawa Hospital, helping us deliver timely care that is specific to their health needs. It also allows our staff to work with the clients to connect them to adequate housing and other supports.

Skills & Training



When you have stayed in a shelter for months or years, it can be daunting to move back into your own home. We ensure that adult men and women get the help and support they need by providing them with life and financial skills, such as how to budget and search for various services online. We have programs that enable clients to identify and maintain meaningful employment opportunities.

Rapid Housing Employment Program

It's a myth that homeless people don't want to work. Our Rapid Housing Employment Program helps clients who are ready for **independent housing and meaningful employment.** We identify housing options and work with local businesses to help clients find employment opportunities. Thanks to a grant from The Ontario Trillium Foundation, we are able to provide a wage subsidy in some situations.

Good Day Workshop

Good Day Workshop is a **social enterprise and day program** where participants can learn life skills and build friendships. Many of the participants experience barriers to employment due to living with physical disabilities, mental health challenges and/or addictions. Participants learn wood making and furniture refurnishing skills. A fundraising partnership with the United Way has allowed us to hire a business development officer to help enhance our social enterprise.

Supportive Living



Our network of housing options is designed to meet the diverse needs of our residents and allows individuals to move from one level of housing with minimal supports to residences that cater to those with more complex needs. All of the men and women in our residences have experienced homelessness or have been at risk of being homeless.

The Oaks

The Oaks is a unique partnership between Shepherds, Ottawa Inner City Health Inc. and the Canadian Mental Health Association. It is home to one of our managed alcohol programs. Fifty-five men and women are cared for 24/7. From nutritious meals to medical care to engaging activities, the residents thrive now that they are out of the shelter system.



St. Andrew's

St. Andrew's Residence is apartment-style living for 37 men and women with concurrent disorders such as mental health challenges and addictions, but who are capable of living independently with staff support. Residents are very active in a variety of clubs and activities to encourage a sense of community.

Brigid's Place

Brigid's Place is a no-barrier home for 11 women who have experienced life on the streets.

For many of the women, Brigid's is their first safe home in many years. Residents share common areas and meet regularly as a group to set the rules of the home.

Hope Living

Hope Living is a suburban supportive living residence in Kanata for 90 men and women who live with mental health and physical challenges, many of whom are aging. Everything in this building is designed to enable clients to maintain their independence with 24/7 support from compassionate staff.



Volunteers



Shepherds of Good Hope is able to provide care and services to the thousands of men and women who come to us every year thanks to the generous support of our more than 400 volunteers. Together, they annually donate more than 65,000 hours of time. If we had to pay for that time, it would cost approximately \$1.2 million to cover off the work of our volunteers.

Paul thrives in supportive living

Paul likes the suburban life. Now living at St. Andrew's Residence, Paul says he loves to look out his window and see the dozens of trees in full bloom in the summer.

During the day, he likes to go for walks. Sometimes it's to check out the garden. On other days, his adventure takes through the nearby neighbourhood.

Bird watching is one of his favourite summer activities. He says he's spotted many different types of birds in the neighbourhood.

If the weather isn't cooperating, Paul can find lots to do at this supportive living residence. He likes to play

pool or listen to music. He's a big fan of late 70's rock and still has a lot of cassettes and albums to choose from.

It's a stark change from what Paul has known during most of his time at Shepherds. For 23 years he lived in various programs at the downtown shelter.

During the day, he liked to go on

long walks in the market and near Parliament Hill. He enjoyed bike riding, too.

As a member of the Shepherds of Good Hope community, Paul is part of a large and caring community. Staff organize weekly outings for our residents. An anniversary barbecue is held every summer and family members often join our residents for Christmas celebrations.

Paul says it didn't take long to appreciate the benefits of supportive living.

He says the staff have been great and have helped make his adjustment easier.

Elisa starts new chapter

Three times, Elisa nearly died from alcohol poisoning.

That's when he finally decided The Oaks was the place he needed to be.

The Oaks is a supportive living residence which also houses our largest Managed Alcohol Program (MAP).

This program helps chronic alcoholics become healthier by monitoring their alcohol intake, ensuring they eat healthy meals every day and keeping them active.

For Elisa, the program was the difference between life and death. He said when he lived in the shelter he often resorted to drinking hairspray or hand sanitizer.

He joined MAP in the shelter and over time he started to improve. He got healthier and the temptation to binge drink diminished.

He enjoyed the companionship of the other men and women in the program.

Eventually, Elisa was confident enough that he wanted to try living on his own. Whenever someone is ready for more independent living,



we work with the person to help them find appropriate housing.

In late 2015, Elisa moved into his own apartment. He was thrilled with the space. Like a lot of homeless men and women who find their own place, knowing they don't have to share a bathroom is the first thing they celebrate.

Elisa said it was also a lot more quiet than living downtown in the market.

But after a few months, he realized it wasn't working. By himself, he wasn't able to manage his alcohol intake. Friends would drop by and they would drink. His health started to worsen after the binge drinking started up again.

After three brushes with death, Elisa

knew he had to change quickly. He had visited The Oaks before and had friends from the shelter living there.

Earlier this year, Elisa moved into his new room at The Oaks.

Elisa says his health has greatly improved. You can often find him in the common area playing cards with his friends. Recently, his son visited him from the north.

Elisa is thankful for these new and positive changes in his life at The Oaks.






