The vulnerable individuals we support are in the throes of three crises: a housing crisis, the continuing opioid crisis and an ongoing pandemic. Post-pandemic, we cannot go back to crowded shelters, which were designed to be temporary respites for individuals experiencing homelessness.

We are working with City Councillors like Catherine McKenney to address the lack of affordable housing in Ottawa. We're advocating for appropriate resources for individuals living with significant traumas that have led them to become homeless.

We are a city of resourceful, empathetic people who care about making our community a safe and welcoming place for all. We simply must make homelessness and housing our collective priorities so that everyone has a place to call home.

# **MEET ELISAPEE**

Elisapee moved to Ottawa from Iqaluit, Nunavut seven years ago to be closer with her family: her husband Norman and her four kids. At the time, she was drinking heavily and found herself living at Shepherds of Good Hope.

After staying in Shepherds of Good Hope's Women's Special Care Unit, she moved to The Oaks, our supportive housing facility in Carlington. Today, Elisapee is part of a large community of other Inuit residents at The Oaks and has reconnected with her family - her husband, Norman, even lives with her!

"You always feel welcome at The Oaks. There's very friendly people here and they're helping me to drink less," she says.


The COVID-19 pandemic has been difficult on Elisapee and her family. She hasn't been able to hug her four-year-old granddaughter since the pandemic began, nor has she been able to visit home to see her extended family in Cape Dorset.





# 20,745 **COLLABORATION** TRAUMA-**NIGHTLY BETWEEN EMERGENCY** INFORMED **STAYS SERVICES HEALTHCARE Transitional Emergency Shelter** (TESP) runs like a mini hospital. It supports people experiencing homelessness who need to access healthcare services. Shelter-based healthcare allows us to support people in our shelter in a dignified manner without relying on emergency services. In fact, if you see an ambulance or police car outside our shelter, chances are they are dropping someone off for care, not picking them up!

# **#HOTELS2HOMES**

COVID-19 demonstrated the critical importance of having a home in which to stay safe.

The pandemic also presents an opportunity to transition vacant buildings like hotels into affordable homes for our most vulnerable.

Shepherds of Good Hope was pleased to partner on this campaign to urge all levels of government to take this action. We collected over 200 signatures from staff volunteers and clients on one day of action.

We continue to use our voice to advocate for this and other sustainable housing solutions in our city.

# THE TRAILER MOVES INDOORS


Our Supervised Consumption and Treatment site, "The Trailer", is essential to combatting the opioid crisis in Ottawa especially for our most vulnerable, but it has long outgrown its space!

Following extensive renovations, in early fall the program moved indoors to our shelter building.

This allows us, in partnership with Ottawa Inner City Health, to provide expanded services to our clients, especially postinjection monitoring and support.

# FRESHER FOOD, COOLER TRUCK

Thanks to your support, Shepherds of Good Hope purchased a new refrigerated truck to pick up perishable food donations across our city. We can now pick up food donations we couldn't safely transport previously. Our truck picks up so many donations, we put nearly 2,800 kms on the truck each day!





# **MEET IRWIN**

I lived on the streets for more than a decade. I slept in banks and apartment lobbies, anywhere I could stay warm.

My name is Irwin and I live at The Oaks, one of Shepherds of Good Hope's supportive housing residences.

After living on the streets for five years, I now have a place of my own. I have a community of great friends. I have overcome a lot of trauma in my life, but I am happy now.

A home means people don't look at me differently or ignore me. I am me again.

I love to cook spaghetti dinner on Thursdays with the volunteers, staff and people who live at the Oaks. It's nice to give back to Shepherds of Good Hope as they gave me hope again after all these years.

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
# WHY I DONATE TO SHEPHERDS OF GOOD HOPE



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# **IN MEMORY OF JOHN**

In honour and recognition of John Blakely who passed away June 21st surrounded by his family.

John was a kind and gentle soul, a talented writer, poet, musician, father and veteran. He bravely served in the Royal Canadian Regiment from 1967 to 1971.

He eventually found himself using Shepherds of Good Hope's services and transitioned to our supportive housing programs, Hope Discovery and St. Andrew Residence. In his later years, he moved to Hope Living in Kanata, where he was a beloved member of the community. He was always gracious, courteous, and took a real interest in the lives of his friends, staff and volunteers.

John could often be found with his guitar or bringing the audience to tears at karaoke night. An avid reader, he recommended books and wrote poems for the people he knew. He adored his family and spoke at length about his three sons - he was so proud of them.

John advocated for veterans like himself who returned home to find themselves struggling with trauma and mental health issues. He believed strongly that no one should have to struggle for a sense of belonging and dignity.

John will be dearly missed by all who knew him.

And that is dying.






